



Andean Textile Arts Tour **BOLIVIA**

August 8 - 21, 2023

Explore the traditional arts, cultures, and natural wonders of Peru's southern neighbor.

- Visit the artisans of ArteCampo in Santa Cruz and the Cochabamba weavers at ASUR in Sucre.
- Spend time with J'alqa and Candelaria weavers in their villages, and explore the famous Tarabuco Market.
- Tour a silver mine in Potosi (UNESCO World Heritage site) and visit the Royal Mint House.
- Travel through the high plateau, see herds of llamas and vicunas, and meet local quinoa growers.
- Watch the sunset over the magical salt planes of Uyuni, and spend the night in a salt hotel.
- Fly over the high Andes to La Paz to visit the National Museum of Ethnography and Folklore.
- Explore the shores of Lake Titicaca.
- Wander through the Witches' Market in La Paz and view the city from above on telefericos.

Raul Jaimes Callanaupa grew up in the village of Chinchero, Peru, as the child and grandson of weavers. He received his degree in tourism from the University of San Antonio Abad. The number one thing that he wants his travelers to experience is his Andean Culture. He has led

tours in Peru and Bolivia for twenty-three years with travel companies such as Andean Treks and Overseas Adventure Travel in the U.S. and Exodus in Great Britain, before opening his own travel agency in 2014, Day Hikes and Self Guided Tours Peru (D.H.S.G). In 2004 Raul was named one of the “Best of the Best” tour guides internationally by Overseas Adventure Travel.

Kevin Healy received his BA in government from University of Notre Dame, his master’s degree in Latin American Studies from Georgetown University and his Ph.D. from Cornell University. For several decades he was a grant officer of the Inter-American Foundation, where he specialized in the Andean countries of Bolivia, Peru, Colombia, and Ecuador. For his work in Bolivia, Healy was decorated by the Bolivian government with the Gran Orden de Educacion at the rank of Commendador. Healy has taught at Georgetown University, George Washington University, American University, and Johns Hopkins University. His book *Llamas, Weavings, and Organic Chocolate* features Bolivian grassroots development success stories.

Bolivia Tour Itinerary

August 8 and 9 Fly to Santa Cruz de la Sierra with arrival evening of the 8th or early morning of the 9th. Explore Santa Cruz at own pace..

August 9 Morning briefing with Raul and Kevin, group lunch followed by a visit to the Arte Campo museum and store. Arte Campo represents 14 associations producing Indigenous and campesino crafts of the Bolivian lowlands.

August 10 Drive to the community of Buena Vista. Founded in 1694 as a Jesuit mission, it overlooks Amboro National Park. We will visit the Arte Campo artisans who weave with the jipi japa palm.

August 11 Flight to Sucre, one of the most charming cities in Bolivia. We'll take a walking tour and spend the afternoon at ASUR, a non-profit which helps weaving communities maintain their cultural integrity by promoting the production and sale of their high-quality textiles. ASUR works with the Jalq'a and Tarabuco communities among others. We'll have a demonstration by the highland weavers of Cochabamba.

August 12 Visit to the community of J'alqa to interact with the weavers.

August 13 Visit to Tarabuco to experience one of the most famous markets in all of Bolivia. Many of the local people in Tarabuco still wear traditional dress, including members of the Yamapara community. We'll visit a Tarabuco weaver, and have ample time to wander the market.

August 14 Free day to explore. in the late afternoon we'll enjoy a private concert performed by well-known folk music group, Los Masis.

August 15 Drive to Potosi. The city came into existence after the discovery of silver there in 1545 and quickly became famous for its wealth. Within three decades its population surpassed 150,000, making it the largest city in the New World. As part of a walking tour we will visit the UNESCO-listed Royal Mint, including its excellent museum. Our tour will continue to miner's market, then we'll enjoy the sunset on Cerro Rico, and climb to the foot hills to interact with miners, with an optional walk into the mine.

August 16 We'll start the morning with a drive to Uyuni across the high Andes, see llamas and wild vicuñas grazing, and view quinoa fields before descending to the high plateau town of Uyuni. After lunch we will meet with quinoa growers. After checking in to our hotel, we will drive to the salt plain to enjoy the sunset.

August 17 Drive across the salt plains. The Salar de Uyuni, covering more than 4,086 square miles, are the most extensive in the world, and so level that the surface is used to calibrate the altimeters on board satellites. On a still day, the thin layer of water covering the salt forms a great mirror reflecting the sky. We'll then visit Inka Wasi, an island formed by fossilized/petrified coral reefs.

August 18 Morning flight to La Paz. Based on our arrival time we'll explore the shores of Lake Titicaca, the town of Guaqui, and the new hand-made pottery center in La Paz.

August 19 Guided tour of NATIONAL MUSEUM OF ETHNOGRAPHY AND FOLKLORE. Bolivia's diverse Indigenous culture includes 39 independent ethnic groups. Our tour may include interactions with Indigenous weavers at the museum. In the afternoon we'll enjoy a tour of La Paz itself. Bolivia's capital perches in the magnificent, snowcapped Andes Mountains; it is crowded, noisy, and decidedly rough around the edges. We'll pay a visit to the "Witches' Market" where members of the Indigenous Aymara community sell beautiful handmade products, fresh local produce, as well as a variety of potions, medicinal plants, spells and spiritual advice. In contrast to this traditional lifestyle La Paz also has a cosmopolitan vibe, a city undergoing rapid change. Hipster cafes, chic boutiques, fine dining restaurants and a burgeoning art scene have established a presence in recent years, steadily transforming La Paz into the continent's coolest urban center.

Aug 20 A chance to explore more other museums or view La Paz from overhead, via its famous cable cars.

Aug 21 Flights home.
